

Route 618 Bridge **Replacement Project**

OIL CITY, PA - Work to replace the bridge that carries Route 618 over a tributary of Conneaut Creek in Sadsbury Township, is expected to begin April 15.

The project will replace the existing bridge, which is located between Ellis Avenue and the Sunset View Motel with a box culvert. Work will also include minor roadway work near the bridge as well as new pavement markings.

Construction is expected to begin April 15, 2024, weather permitting, and is expected to be completed in July 2024.

Route 6. It is expected to be in next to the exit channel and reconplace for one and a half months.

The existing corrugated metal pipe culvert bridge was built in 1980. It is classified as poor condition. Approximately 1,900 vehicles a day use the bridge, on average.

The contractor is Horizon Construction Group, Inc., of Seneca, PA. The contract cost is \$617,700, which is to be paid entirely with federal funds.

This project is funded at least in part by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL). In 2024 alone, the BIL is bringing approximately \$25 million in additional funding to the northwest region to be allocated by the department and its local Metropolitan and Rural Planning Organization (MPO/RPO) partners. In the northwest region, the planning partners are the Erie Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), the Shenango Valley MPO, and the Northwest Rural Planning Organization (RPO), for projects in Crawford, Erie, Forest, Mercer, Venango and Warren counties.

\$265,000 grant to rehab

Conneautville Dam

HARRISBURG - Conneautville Borough will receive a \$265,000 grant to repair the Conneautville Dam so it meets federal and state safety requirements, according to a recent news release from Sen. Michele Brooks (R-50).

Both the United States Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection identified the dam as a high hazard potential dam.

"These repairs will help protect the families and businesses of Conneautville," Brooks said. "Utilizing this grant will help to defray costs and move us closer to completing this project."

Funding will be used to realign the auxiliary spillway channel, expand the training dike to comply with NRCS criteria, install a sheet pile wall to prevent auxiliary spillway flow from entering the gully


West Center Road Bridge replacement

The bridge is located on West Center Road (Route 4004) just west of its intersection with Beaver Center Road (Route 4001).

The project will include removal of the current steel bridge and construction of a new single span, concrete structure, waterproofing, minor asphalt paving near the bridge, as well as updates to the drainage and guiderail. Work is expected to occur during the 2025 construction

School board changing gate prices

The Conneaut School board meeting in April voting session last week voted 6-2 to change gate prices for those attending sporting events in the district.

The changes were recommended by the district's athletic ad hoc committee largely following one person's complaint he had spent over \$300 during the fall and winter sports seasons to watch family members take part in activities.

High school and middle school students will now be allowed into games at no charge, while those students under age 13, must be accompanied b an adult.

Active military and military veterans will be charged \$1.00 to attend games as will senior citizens.

A 2-person gate pass can be purchased for \$50 with that pass good for the entire school year.

Those attending from other schools will be charged \$6 adults, and \$4 students.

GW Hall, chair of the board's athletic committee had argued at a previous meeting that doing away with charging students to get into games - football, basketball, volleyball primarily - should fill the home school stands thus showing support for the home team playing.

Typically gate receipts help pay for expenses in running the various sports programs, the cut in prices and lower gate revenues now to be made up by the taxpayer.

Gate revenues were not discussed at the recent athletic committee meeting held recently and from which the recommendations of prices changes came from.

Board member David Schaef, who voted no on the proposed changes, was joined by John Burnham in the 6-2 vote with Hall, Ryan Klink, Ed Williamson, Steve Nader, Adam Horne, and Dot Luckock voting for the changes.

Schaef questioned whether stands would be filled by a declining student enrollment, noting successful teams draw support from fans, noted past efforts at selling season passes that drew little support and wondered about the supervision of lower age students.




A NEW LANGUAGE



Walker, despite his work and volunteer schedule, was appointed code enforcement officer, he saying he was willing to serve.

The previous code enforcement officer resigned from the position, pay being \$15 an hour plus mileage. Walker also will training paid


