# CASH school threat unfounded, 3rd day student count down

Conneaut Schools Superintendent Jarrin Sperry put an on-call out to families early Monday morning noting the threat was not valid and schools in the district

It is unclear if an individual has been identified.

School district student numbers were once again down from numbers reported a year earlier, but not as much as in some previous years.

> A very small kindergarten class was noted in this year's third day count - only 96 students, that the smallest class of any grade; the next smallest class was 121 in the sixth grade.

The two elementary schools show an increase in student numbers but much of that has to do with grade 5 being added at those schools this year.

## Conneaut Lake council receives no bids on damaged Richmond Street repair job

The Conneaut Lake Borough Council held their monthly meeting on Wednesday, September 11th, at the Town Hall in Conneaut Lake. Present were Dick Holabaugh, Council President; Penny Monahan, Council Vice-President; Jim Tigri, Mayor of Conneaut Lake; Brenda Braden, Secretary/Treasurer; Public Works Supervisor, Jim Donnachie; and Council Members John Chuey, Bill Eldridge, Jim Ross, and Mario DeBlasio. Present via phone call was Matt Jorden, Solicitor.

The meeting began promptly at 7:00pm with the pledge to the flag.

In stark contrast to the last few months, the previous month's minutes were approved unanimously by the board with little to no discussion needed.

The motion to pay bills was approved unanimously by the board.

Visitors on the agenda included Sandy Eldridge and Jane Smith. Sandy Eldridge was there on behalf of the Crawford County Penn State Master Gardeners to ask permission to install a plaque about rain gardens in the rain garden on Fireman's Beach in memory of Pat Lace, a member who was very

She assured the council it would

be at no expense to the taxpayers and it was approved unanimously. She also asked for an event permit for the Ice House Festival on

Saturday, December 7th on behalf of the Conneaut Lake Community Development Committee. This was also approved unanimously. Smith asked the board about the

possibility of putting banners up on poles in the borough to honor local veterans. DeBlasio described the endeavor as "overdue for Conneaut Lake," and made a motion to put it on the agenda in January 2025.

Eldridge suggested that, perhaps instead of banners that the families of veterans would have to pay for themselves, they put a plaque in Memorial Park with the names of all local veterans at no cost to their families.

It was determined that the Property Committee would look into all possibilities for honoring veterans and report back with their findings, perhaps voting on a plan in Janu-

## **Dandelion Days**

The reflections of one man ... - By George P. Nowack

### YOU HOLD THE KEY...

Over the course of the past few years I have become aware, as most of us have, of the tremendous turmoil and separatism which has divided us.

We have, somewhat, turned onto a Pathway which could lead to Isolationism.

Isolationism...a very dangerous, treacherous path to follow...one which, inevitably leads to hatred and self- destruction.

In my many years of travel across our great Nation, and during my time serving our Commonwealth in various representational capacities, I witnessed too many times the decay and destruction of groups, organizations, and communities which chose to "close their doors" to the outside. Without exception, each of these unfortunate circumstances could have been reversed had these doors been opened...even slightly.

My experiences led me to wonder:

What was the causality of these isolated practices? What would cause a group, and in the extreme, an entire community to follow such a practice?

Frequently, I discovered that, often in the case of a regional area, what had once been a Dream of economic prosperity had been eradicated by forces beyond the control of the People populating that area. In such instances, the citizens felt they had no choice but to "band together" for their survival. to change, and even, disappear Mistrust of ANY outside factors would grow, and haunt these folks with further images of possible destruction.

Once this path is embarked upon, it becomes increasingly difficult for any "outside" suggestions to be accepted...or, even considered. Eventually, the singular concerns of a close-minded group (while TOTALLY understandable in the beginning stages) become the ONLY concerns of that group's members. Isolationism became the means of security.

#### **EXAMPLE**

The Northern regions across our Commonwealth once shared a common Dream. That Dream included the "certainty" of economic prosperity based upon the iron/steel/natural fuel industries. Railroad lines and tracks traversed the entire Region, connecting the

People and Communities all along munities through the realization the pathway.

Various forms of agricultural and support businesses grew to accommodate the potentially growing population. Schools were built... post offices flourished...connections to the larger urban areas were established...venues (such as regional amusement parks) were created to offer retreat from the hustle and bustle of everyday commit-


#### **BUT THEN**

The promising industries started from the Region. The Dream began to shatter. The effects were, and in many instances still ARE, disastrous. Businesses closed...the parks were abandoned...the People began to leave. What remained: Growing Fear and Isolation.

In many, many instances, I have witnessed first-hand the effects of this disaster. I have felt the Fear of innumerable Communities. Have listened to their reasons for their "closed doors." Have taken to heart their mistrust. Have attempted to assist in their Journey back to success...and have often been turned-

A few years ago, I served as the Vice-Chairperson for the Pennsylvania Scenic Byways Commission in our Region. The goal was to establish a scenic byway designation beginning on the Eastern side of Conneaut Lake, and extend through Linesville to the Ohio border, with a secondary section leading through North Shenango to the shores of Pymatuning Lake. We were successful in achieving our goal. The signs of Scenic Byway designation have been in place for sometime. Have you taken the time to notice and follow the trail?

Similarly, I also served the Commonwealth in coordinating the goals of the communities along the entirely of the PA RT 6 corridor. My goal was to bring together the commonalities of the many com-



of the Creative Forces (Artists) and the economic effects of these individuals. Again, the goal was basically attained. The shared commonality was readily observable, and accepted.

#### AND NOW

to overcome. Fear of outside influences and concepts is, similarly, somewhat insurmountable. When a 5-8. small group gains control of ANY situation, progress is extremely difficult to achieve.

The TRUE answer to Regional, and NATIONAL success lies in the concept of Communal Cooperation. This is the goal and concept which will, I am TOTALLY convinced, bring prosperity and development back to ANY Region... and to our Nation, and we as a PEOPLE.

We have a LOONG way to go; however, the goal IS attainable.

Although the industries and tracks of the Past have essentially vanished, the bonds which tie us ALL together still remain. The Byway is still here...the Communities still exist. All which needs to sition. be done is to "remove the blinders" and open ourselves to one another.

What might, perhaps, lead us ancestors set before us, is to listen carefully to the words of the Youngbloods' 1969 melody, GET TOGETHER.

Maybe, just MAYBE, the road to success as a People lies in those holidays, no weekends, no summer

Love is but a song we sing Fear's the way we die You can make the mountains ring Or make the angels cry...

If you hear the song I sing You will understand, listen: You hold the key to love and fear All in your trembling hand Just one key unlocks them both It's there at your command



She frequently commented how blessed she was to have such a wonderful loving family.

Bea and Tom were renowned collectors of Amphora and built a remarkable collection of their own. Bea was instrumental in forming the 'Amphora Collectors communications for the club for many years. In 2001, they hosted the club's international convention at their home in Meadville, PA.

By no means could a remembrance such as this contain an adequately comprehensive view of the impact and love she put into this world, but some of her many titles may include loving mother, devoted and faithful wife, loving grandmother, aunt, cousin, sisterin-law, and great grandmother, artist, Amphora vase collector and antique collector.

She had an amazing gift for creativity and was always challenging herself to learn and develop new artistic skills. She became proficient in painting, basket weaving, pottery, hooking and felting making handmade gifts for others which are treasured.

Bea absolutely loved the finest in hand crafted chocolates and became the family chocolate connoisseur. Generous in all aspects of her life, the only exception was chocolate. She always had a stash hidden somewhere and disciplined herself to one chocolate per day as a "treat."

In later years, she battled physical pain and limitations without complaint, demonstrating her unique strength, grace and fortitude.
