The Dandelion name first developed in the 15th century. It was derived from the Medieval Latin phrase "dens lionis," which refers to the jagged shape of the leaves by calling them a "lion's tooth".

This transformed into "dent-delion" in French, and then became Dandelion in Middle English.

We still use the same name today because it's easy to remember, and definitely still applies as a description of how the plant looks.
