Linesville Historical Society open weekly



marks my 16th year writing for Community News. It's been an incredible blessing to write what amounts to a devotional column writing for Community News. since 2008. I've written more than a thousand columns and township calling to write. And I knew articles about my community.

> My first published article appeared on the front page of the New Castle News in 2007, and featured the story of Christian missionaries who planned on adopting two girls from Guatemala. The Meadville Tribune also published two articles I wrote about new local businesses in 2008. It was exciting.

> Secondly, I wanted to earn money to help support my family. As a then stay-at-home mom with toddlers, writing was one of the only ways I might earn a little income.

Both of the daily papers that published my work paid me, but they were one-shot gigs. I knew I needed a regular paycheck, but They said I'd never earn a living had no idea where to find one as a freelance writer.

> Thirdly, I wanted to promote my local community. My mentor in the Christian Writers Guild suggested writing brochures for my local chamber of commerce. That didn't appeal to me at all.







Springboro gets clean audit report

Springboro Borough Council received a clean audit report when the 2023 audit of fiances was completed and was announced at the council's August meeting.

Some figures released noted the borough received some \$55,065 in in water fund revenues, the total borough revenue coming in at \$259,039.

Water expenses totaled \$35,864, and general government expenses totaled \$58,486 with the auditor saying there was a deficit in the general fund [almost \$47,000] and an overall budget deficit of \$50,140.

Council wondered about being in touch with other companies as to costs with the borough paying near \$1,900 a year for the current software billing program.

Summerhill Township supervisors stand ready to adopt a short term rental ordinance to set rules for local landowners who want to rent properties to individuals on a short term basis such as a weekend, or so.

Short term rentals typically take the place of motels and hotels and involve houses, trailers, a room or so, typically to persons looking to come into an area for the short time period as a tourist/visitor. Many short term rentals are seen as a place to party and have a good time away from the renter's home areas.

The short term rental rules were briefly discussed at Summerhill's August meeting with plans to adopt the rules at September's meeting.

It was reported that supervisor chairman Brian Schaef and township secretary Andrew McClymonds had read the proposed ordinance with the public offered the chance to read the rules as well.

Short term rental rules typically list rules such as the placement of smoke detectors and fire extinguishers, how many people can be at the rental, limits on vehicle parking, and who to contact if there is a problem.

Summit Township and North Shenango Township are local areas that have short term rental rules in place.


